KEYNOTE: Ken Chen: Growing Your Nonprofit and Growing as A Person

Ken Chen served as the Executive Director of the Asian American Writers' Workshop from 2008 to 2019. During his tenure, AAWW launched fellowships, literary festivals, online magazines, social justice programs, and increased its budget from \$200K to \$1.1M. He is the recipient of the Yale Younger Poets Award, the oldest annual literary award in America, for his book *Juvenilia*, which was selected by the poet Louise Glück. An NEA, NYFA and Bread Loaf fellow, Chen co-founded the cultural website Arts & Letters Daily and CultureStrike, a national arts organization dedicated to migrant justice. His essay "Authenticity Obsession, or Conceptualism as Minstrel Show"—on the appropriations of Kenneth Goldsmith and Vanessa Place—became a key text in contemporary conversations about race and literature, and has been cited in The New Republic, The New Yorker, LARB, Jacket, and New York Times. A graduate of Yale Law School, he successfully defended the asylum application of an undocumented Muslim high school student from Guinea detained by Homeland Security. From 2019 to 2020, he will be working as a Cullman Fellow at the New York Public Library on his next book: *Death Star*, a multi-genre book about attempting to return-migrate his father from the underworld and encountering there everything that has been destroyed by colonialism.

9:45-12:45pm Session 2: Leading by Heart: How Awareness of Our Style and Emotions Help Us Lead Facilitator: Dolah Saleh Breakout Session Facilitators: Gloria Jacobs & Debora Ott

> This presentation will highlight the main points of leadership style and temperament, and show why that awareness is important to leading effectively. Dolah uses her certifications in the Birkman Method and Genos Emotional Intelligence to assess and coach individuals. Leading others is greatly facilitated by embracing the concepts within these two models, since they enhance self-and relationship management. Our emotions affect our behavior, performance, and decision making. Learning how to develop our emotional intelligence muscle allows us to be a credible leader who inspires trust, builds relationships, and enables collaborative attainment of organizational goals. Whether you are in a leadership role by default or design, knowing who you are and how you are personally motivated greatly increases the likelihood of your sensitivity to others and their uniqueness. To get a general idea of where each leader fits along the personality/temperament/preferences quadrants in determining motivational needs, each participant will have the opportunity to complete a self-evaluation questionnaire.

This keynote will discuss the responsibility of literary arts leaders to create and maintain positive organizational culture and provide examples of how arts leaders have created spaces for community building within their organizations.
