2022 Facing Pages Statewide Literary Arts Convening **Presenter BIOS**

Rodney Appleby is a consummate professional actor, musician, singer, composer, and teaching artist. The original bassist for The Souls of Solomon, a Buffalo-based gospel group known as the pioneers of gospel funk, he toured and played in festivals and concerts globally with the likes of Deep Purple's Ian Gillan, Chuck Berry, Albert Collins, Mary Wells and Eddie Kendricks (of the Temptations) with the Motown review, and many others. In 1995, Rodney was inducted into the Buffalo Music Hall of Fame while recording and performing with Buffalo-based Anthracite. In the 1990s, he served as Just Buffalo Literary Center's Director of Interdisciplinary Programs in Poetry & Jazz. He was a long-time member of Ujima Theatre, and served as its music director on many productions over the course of thirty years. Currently, he is a Music Teaching Artist developing a curriculum for the Dunbar Project, Ujima's youth arts workshop.

Mahogany L. Browne, selected as Kennedy Center's Next 50, is the Executive Director of JustMedia, a media literacy initiative with a focus on the criminal legal system, and is informed by her career as a writer, organizer, & educator. Browne has received fellowships from Art for Justice Fund, Air Serenbe, Cave Canem, Poets House, Mellon Research & The Robert Rauschenberg Foundation. She is the author of recent works: Vinyl Moon, Chlorine Sky, Woke: A Young Poets Call to Justice, Woke Baby, Black Girl Magic & book-length poem: I Remember Death By Its Proximity to What I Love. She is the founder of Woke Baby Book Fair, a traveling diverse reading campaign, is the first-ever poet-in-residence at the Lincoln Center, and lives in Brooklyn, NY.

Kyle Dacuyan is Executive Director of The Poetry Project at St. Mark's, where he leads an annual program of more than 100 readings, performances, lectures, and workshops, as well as a breadth of scholarly and creative publications, and fellowships for emerging writers and curators. Prior to his role at The Poetry Project, as Co-Director of National Outreach and Membership at PEN America, he launched and administered a micro-grant program supporting writers around advocacy efforts in local communities, specifically connected to press freedom and media literacy. He was a 2021 NEA Fellow in Creative Writing, and his first book, INCITEMENTS is forthcoming with Ugly Duckling Presse.

Katie Down is a licensed creative arts therapist, performer and sound artist based in the Hudson Valley and Brooklyn, NY. Originally a classically-trained and jazz flutist, Katie's music intersects the realms of sound art, free improvisation, Americana, Jazz, and world music as a multi-instrumentalist including piano, ukulele, hand percussion and homemade instruments including glass percussion and steel cello. Katie's sound designs for theatre and dance have garnered her Drama Desk nominations and the award for best sound

design from The Connecticut Critic's Circle. She is the recipient of several grants, residencies, and commissions including the Mid-Atlantic Arts Foundation, The Jerome Foundation, BAM, Watermill, Chashama, Music Omi, and Meet the Composer. Katie is a member of the music therapy faculty at SUNY New Paltz and maintains a private psychotherapy practice, SoundWell Creative Arts Therapy.

Cornelius Eady is a Poet/Playwright/Songwriter and Cave Canem Co-Founder . Born in Rochester, NY in 1954, he is a Professor of English and Chair of Excellence at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. He is the author of several poetry collections, including Victims of the Latest Dance Craze, winner of the 1985 Lamont Prize; The Gathering of My Name, nominated for the 1992 Pulitzer Prize in Poetry; Brutal Imagination, and Hardheaded Weather. He wrote the libretto to Diedra Murray's opera Running Man, which was short listed for the Pulitzer Prize in Theatre, and his verse play Brutal Imagination won the Oppenheimer Prize for the best first play from an American Playwright in 2001. His awards include Fellowships from the NEA, the Guggenheim Foundation, and the Rockefeller Foundation. Noah Falck is the author of Exclusions (Tupelo Press, 2020) finalist for the 2020 Believer Book Award for poetry, as well as several chapbooks including You Are In Nearly Every Future (Dostoyevsky Wannabe, 2017). He co-edited My Next Heart: New Buffalo Poetry (BlazeVox Books, 2017) and has been anthologized in Poem-A-Day 365 Poems for Every Occasion (Abrams Books, 2015). His work has appeared in Kenyon Review, Literary Review, Ploughshares, & Poets.org. Originally from Dayton, Ohio, where he spent 10 years teaching elementary school, he now lives in Buffalo, New York, where he works as Education Director at Just Buffalo Literary Center and curates the Silo City Reading Series, a multimedia poetry series inside a 130-foot high abandoned grain elevator.

Mary Gannon is a veteran nonprofit administrator with more than twenty-five years of experience in the literary field. Currently, she's the Executive Director of the Community of Literary Magazines & Presses (CLMP). Prior to her position at CLMP, Mary was Associate Director/Director of Content for the Academy of American Poets, where she oversaw the production of the organization's award-winning website, Poets.org, its popular Poem-a-Day series, and its Education Program. For many years, she worked at Poets & Writers, Inc., where she headed up Poets & Writers Magazine and pw.org as Editorial Director. An award-winning poet whose poems have been published widely, Mary has published numerous articles about publishing and the literary field and has profiled such notable authors as The New Yorker editor David Remnick and nonfiction writer John Haskell, fiction writers Jay McInerney and Heidi Julavits, and poets Anne Carson and Major Jackson. She

is co-author with her husband, Kevin Larimer, of The Poets & Writers Complete Guide to Being a Writer, published by Avid Reader Press in 2020.

Patricia Spears Jones is poet, playwright, anthologist, educator, and cultural activist is the winner of the 2017 Jackson Poetry Prize from Poets & Writers. She is author of The Beloved Community, forthcoming from Copper Canyon Press; A Lucent Fire: New and Selected Poems, White Pine Press, and ten other poetry collections. Her work is in anthologies such as African American Poetry: 250 Years of Struggle and Song: Of Poetry and Protest: From Emmett Till to Trayvon Martin; 2017 Pushcart Prize XLI, Best of Small Presses; and Angles of Ascent: A Norton Anthology of Contemporary African American Poetry. Poems recently published in The New Yorker, The Brooklyn Rail; Ms. Muse, Plume, and CUTTHROAT: A Journal of the Arts. She edited THINK: Poems for Aretha Franklin Inauguration Day Hat and Ordinary Women: An Anthology of New York City Women Poets. She has taught at St. Mark's Poetry Project, Poets House, Community of Writers, Truro Center for the Arts, Fine Arts Work Center, Gemini Ink, Brooklyn Poets, Hurston-Wright, and at Hollins University, Adelphi University, CUNY, and Barnard College. She is organizer of the American Poets Congress and is a Senior Fellow Emeritus of the Black Earth Institute. www.psjones.com.

Robin Lee Jordan has worked with Just Buffalo for many years as a contracted teaching artist. In 2016 she was hired to coordinate programming in the new Just Buffalo Writing Center which provides free after school workshops, meet-the-author, and other opportunities for teens 12-18. Her leadership has been instrumental in the Center's development and success. Jordan has an MFA in Creative Writing (Poetry) Oregon State University. Her creative nonfiction, fiction, and poetry have been published in various journals, including alice blue review, H_NGM_N, Puerto del Sol, and Paper Darts. She received her MFA in Poetry from Oregon State University and is currently working on a mixed-genre collection. She is a founding member of the grassroots community arts project (B)uffalo (A)rt (D)ispensary.

Jisu Kim oversees marketing, sales, and publicity at the Feminist Press. She also acquires and edits books, mostly relating to Asian and Asian diasporic experiences.

Jeffrey Lependorf, a musician, composer, visual artist, and nonprofit arts professional, serves as Executive Director of The Flow Chart Foundation. He formerly served as Executive Director of Small Press Distribution and the Community of Literary Magazines and Presses. He currently also directs the Art Omi: Music international musicians residency, a program that he created for musicians from around the globe to collaborate with one another. He was a fellow of National Arts Strategies' Chief Executives Program and has received numerous grants, awards, and honors. For more information, visit jeffreylependorf.com.

Christine Leahy is a Program Director at the New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA), in charge of the Arts Education and Literature Programs. Initiatives started under her tenure include the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion in Orchestras and Classical Music (DinO) collaboration with the Music program, the New York State Creative Aging Pilot, the NYS Youth Media Symposium and the Mid-Atlantic Teaching Artists Retreat. In previous positions at NYSCA she served in the agency's Facilities, Visual Arts, Museum, Architecture + Design and Folk Arts programs. Christine formerly worked for the artist Jenny Holzer and in the Education department at the Williams College Museum of Art, and has written for The New York Times and National Public Radio. She is a graduate of Williams College.

Alison Meyers is a poet, essayist, and fiction writer, twice nominated for a Pushcart Prize. Her work may be found in literary journals, in the anthology Gathered Light: The Poetry of Joni Mitchell's Songs (Three O'Clock Press), and at www.alisonmeyers.com. She is the Executive Director of Writers & Books, a literary arts center in Rochester, NY. Previously, she served as Executive Director of Cave Canem Foundation (Brooklyn, NY), 2006-2016, and as Poetry Director and Director of Marketing & Communications at Hill-Stead Museum (CT). For many years, she owned and managed a Connecticut-based indie bookstore. She consults as a mentor for LitNYS, is treasurer of the board of Kweli Journal, and serves on the Arts and Humanities Board of Monroe Community College.

Debora Ott is a cultural/creative consultant whose abiding passion is to build community through a shared appreciation of the creative process. Her consulting practice focuses on capacity building, program development, succession, and strategic planning for nonprofit organizations. The founder of Just Buffalo Literary Center, Inc., where she served as Artistic/Executive Director for 23 years, she's the author of the monograph About Face – A Guide to Founder Transition, commissioned by the New York State Council on the Arts. In 1997, she accepted the New York State Governor's Arts Award at Lincoln Center. She served as Arts Education and Literature Program Manager at the Georgia Council for the Arts, and in 2001, founded LitNYS, formerly LitTAP, the Literary Technical Assistance Program, a coalition of New York State literary arts organizations. She's crafted LitNYS' capacity-building Advancement Regrant and Peer-Mentoring programs, over the last 20+ years, and curates Facing Pages, an annual, statewide, literary arts convening.

Laura Pegram, Kweli's founder, is a multidisciplinary artist who is influencing a new generation of aspiring writers. Author, educator, and a jazz vocalist whose cabaret performance teamed her with jazz pianist, Donald Smith, Ms. Pegram is also a painter. Her richly hued vibrant murals are part of several private collections. She has worked as a Development Associate at Scholastic Productions, Inc., as an Instructor at the Frederick Douglass Creative Arts Center and as an Acting Director / Instructor at the John Oliver Killens Young Writers Program. In 2020, she received the 2020 CBC Diversity Outstanding Achievement Award.

David J. Ringwood serves as the Organizational Development Associate for NYCON working from the Mid-Hudson Valley Regional Office in Poughkeepsie. He has more than 20 years of experience working with diverse nonprofit organizations and draws upon his personal and professional experience to strengthen their operations. David has worked with a range of causes including Hospice, American Heart Association, the Dutchess County Arts Council, and the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley. David has also served on several local nonprofit boards. David was a co-founder of Theatre Arts Group (T.A.G. Team) a community theater company located in Poughkeepsie, NY, and currently serves on the Board of Governors for County Players, Inc. in Wappingers Falls, NY, where he resides with his two children. David has a B.A. in English, a minor in Fine Arts, and a concentration in Business Administration from Le Moyne College.

Ira Silverberg has worked in the Literary Arts for nearly forty years. He's been the Editor-in-Chief of Grove Press; Founding Publisher/Co-editor of High Risk Books; a Senior Editor at Simon & Schuster; and a Literary Agent and Foreign Rights Director at two New York agencies. He left his practice as an agent in 2011 to work with the National Endowment for the Arts as Literature Director. Currently, he directs Broadview Arts Management, a consultancy whose projects have included launching Dread Scott's "Slave Rebellion Reenactment"; creating a template for a publishing house for the Brennan Center for Justice; working with Cornelius Eady on the reboot of Poets House.; grant writing for Split This Rock; crisis-management for Black Mountain Institute's Director; board development for Nighboat Books; and capacity development for grantees of LitNYS and Bloomberg Philanthropies' Arts Innovation Management Program. He is a faculty member of the Columbia University MFA Writing Program; and a Board member of Copper Canyon Press. His service gene was activated in his twenties with inspiration and mentorship from Gregory Kolovakos, Literature Director of NYSCA who died of AIDS at 38 years old in 1990.

Laurie Dean Torrell has over 25 years' experience in non-profit organizations and provides administrative support for the LitNYS initiative. Since becoming Just Buffalo's Executive Director in 2002, Torrell has worked to create a top caliber team, with staff and board implementing new curatorial, educational and advocacy initiatives. Under her leadership, the organization has secured competitive national, state, and local grants to more than triple the budget and bring expanded literary programming to the community including the BABEL contemporary author series, and JB Writing Center for teens. Torrell pioneered an Administrative Collaboration which was honored with a National Certificate of Recognition from the Kellogg and Lodestar Foundations; spearheaded JB40, a successful \$1M Advancement Campaign; and secured national grant funding with Detroit colleagues for "Writing Across the Rust Belt," a collaborative capacity building initiative (2019-2024) that is designed to have field-wide impact.

Jafreen Uddin is the first woman to lead AAWW since its founding in 1991. Most recently, she served as Deputy Director of Development for Special Events at PEN America. Prior to joining PEN, she helped oversee Executive Education as an Assistant Director with NYU's Stern School of Business. She began her career with a near-eight-year stint at the Brennan Center for Justice at NYU School of Law, where she helped create the infrastructure for the public programming calendar of events, and spent nearly three years managing an online Book Salon for Aslan Media, spotlighting writers and artists from the greater Middle East/South Asia region. She previously served as Co-Chair of the Board of Directors for Laal NYC, an organization supporting Bangladeshi women in the Bronx, and currently serves as Chair of the Adult Internship Committee for We Need Diverse Books, and as a Literary Council Member for the Brooklyn Book Festival. She received her B.A. in political economics from Barnard College, Columbia University, and her M.A. in global history from NYU's Graduate School of Arts and Science.

Richmond Wills is a Nigerian poet, storyteller, actor and community activist who believes in the power of stories to transform lives and build bridges across cultures. Prior to joining the Just Buffalo staff in 2020, Wills served as a Writing Center Teaching Artist, BABEL volunteer, and public programming coordinator for <u>Words on the Street</u> and <u>The Mocha Center</u>. He is also contributing writer for <u>The Galactic Tribe</u> and continues to work as a community organizer. He co-founded GrayWills book club for Black men to explore literary arts and holds a bachelor's degree in Psychology from the State University of New York at Buffalo. Wills is particularly interested in access-issues and works strategically to ensure that Just Buffalo's community programs, youth education, and other outreach activities are free of real and perceived barriers to participation.
