When he's not on his mat or hanging high from a ladder, he enjoys penning haiku on his daily walks around the city. Anderson is currently an Artist-in-Residence at The Avenue Blackbox Theatre where he volunteers his time as an artist mentor and theater technician, and part of The Avenue's wellness team. Anderson's greatest honor is his commitment to building a loving community.

Rodney Appleby is an actor, musician, singer, composer, and teaching artist. The original bassist for The Souls of Solomon, a Buffalo-based gospel group known as the pioneers of gospel funk, he toured and played in festivals and concerts globally with the likes of Deep Purple's Ian Gillan, Chuck Berry, Albert Collins, Mary Wells, the Motown review, and Eddie Kendricks – of the Temptations – as well as many others. In 1995, Rodney was inducted into the Buffalo Music Hall of Fame while recording and performing with the Buffalo-based group Anthracite. In the 1990s, he served as Just Buffalo Literary Center's Director of Interdisciplinary Programs in Poetry & Jazz. A long-time member of Ujima Theatre Company, he served as its Music Director on many productions over the course of thirty years. Currently, he hosts the Rodney Appleby Experience, a podcast on 106 LIVE Radio, in Atlanta, is engaged as a teaching artist, and has developed curriculum for the Dunbar Project, Ujima's youth arts workshop, and the Love Supreme School of Music in Buffalo, NY.

Cathy Linh Che has worked in nonprofit administration, education, and publishing for over 15 years. In 2012, Cathy was hired as a communications consultant for Kundiman. In 2014, she became Kundiman's Managing Director, and she was hired on as Executive Director in 2016. She has also worked for Kaya Press, New Directions Publishing, and Poets & Writers and has taught at New York University, Fordham University, The Polytechnic University at NYU, and Sierra Nevada College. Cathy is the author of the poetry collection Split (Alice James Books), winner of the Kundiman Poetry Prize, Norma Farber First Book Award from the Poetry Society of America, and the Best Poetry Book Award from the Association of Asian American Studies.

Peter Conners is Executive Director & Publisher of BOA Editions where he has worked since 2003. He is also author of ten published books of nonfiction, poetry, and fiction, published by such presses as Da Capo, City Lights, Cornell University Press, White Pine Press, and others. In 2022, his literary archives were purchased by University of Rochester's Department of Rare Books and Special Collections and the Peter Conners Literary Archives were established. His website is: www.peterconners.com.

Ruth Dickey is the Executive Director of the National Book Foundation and has spent over 25 years working at the intersection of community building, writing, and art. A builder and believer in big dreams, Ruth has had the pleasure of leading organizations in Washington, DC; New Orleans, LA; Cincinnati, OH; and Seattle, WA to dramatically expand their community

impact and achieve wide recognition, including the Washington Post Award for Nonprofit Excellence and coverage in the Stanford Social Innovation Review. She was a 2017 fellow with the National Arts Strategies Chief Executive Program and served as a judge in Fiction for the 2019 National Book Awards. The recipient of a Mayor's Arts Award from Washington DC, Ruth's first book, Mud Blooms (Harbor Mountain Press, 2019), was a finalist for the National Poetry Series and received a 2019 Silver Nautilus, and her second book, Our hollowness sings, is forthcoming from Unicorn Press in 2024. Ruth holds an MFA in Poetry from UNC-Greensboro, and an MA in Latin American Studies and BS in Foreign Service from Georgetown University.

Chris Fanning is a public relations professional and community builder. In addition to his role as Writers & Books' Deputy Director, he holds the position of President of the Neighborhood of the Arts Business Association. Chris worked as a Promotions Coordinator at Entercom Rochester for eight years and was Associate Producer of the Rochester Fringe Festival for five years. He currently serves as a board member of the St. Peter's Community Arts Academy in Geneva and sits on the marketing committee for Cameron Community Ministries.

Mary Gannon is the Executive Director of the Community of Literary Magazines and Presses [CLMP], a nonprofit service organization that supports and advocates for independent literary publishers. A veteran nonprofit administrator with more than twenty years of experience in the literary field, she was the Associate Director/Director of Content for the Academy of American Poets for five years, where she led the relaunch and production of the organization's award-winning website, Poets.org, and its popular Poem-a-Day series. She also oversaw the Academy's Education Program, including Teach This Poem, a weekly offering that received the 2018 National Book Foundation's Innovations in Reading Prize. Prior to working at the Academy, she was the Editorial Director of Poets & Writers, Inc., the country's largest nonprofit organization serving poets and writers of literary prose, where she headed up Poets & Writers Magazine and pw.org. An award-winning poet whose poems have been published widely, Gannon has also published numerous articles about publishing and the literary field and has profiled such notable authors as Anne Carson, Major Jackson, Heidi Julavits, Jay McInerney, and David Remnick. She is co-author with her husband, Kevin Larimer, of the book The Poets & Writers Complete Guide to Being a Writer, published by Avid Reader Press in 2020.

Ron Kavanaugh is a literary activist and founding director of the <u>Literary Freedom Project</u>, a Bronx-based arts organization that believes cultural identity is a fundamental cornerstone in the development of smart, creative, and engaged communities. Born and raised in the Bronx, Kavanaugh has worked with numerous local arts organizations, including The Bronx Museum of the Arts, Bronx Council on the Arts, and En Foco, Inc.

Jisu Kim is the deputy director of Triple Canopy, a magazine that works with artists and writers to address the critical issues that define contemporary life. Working across a multiplicity of forms, the publication is committed to cultivating unconventional, unassimilated forms of thought and expression, and to meaningfully supporting the people who produce them.

Formerly, she worked at the nonprofit publisher Feminist Press, where she oversaw marketing, sales and publicity, and distribution, as well as acquired and edited books. At FP, she led campaigns on books by notable authors such as Michelle Tea, Brontez Purnell, Cristina Rivera Garza, Julian Delgado Lopera, Megan Milks, Grace M. Cho, and many more, as well as edited books by writers such as Bishakh Som and Kyung-sook Shin.

Christine Leahy is a Program Director at the New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA), in charge of the Arts Education and Literature Programs. Initiatives started under her tenure include the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion in Orchestras and Classical Music (DinO) collaboration with the Music program, the New York State Creative Aging Leaders Network and the NYS Youth Media Symposium and the Mid-Atlantic Teaching Artists' Retreat. In previous positions at NYSCA she served in the agency's Facilities, Visual Arts, Museum, Architecture + Design and Folk Arts programs. Christine formerly worked for the artist Jenny Holzer and in the Education department at the Williams College Museum of Art, and has written for The New York Times and National Public Radio.

Jeffrey Lependorf, a performer, composer, visual artist, and nonprofit arts professional, serves as the Executive Director of The Flow Chart Foundation—an organization that explores the interrelationships of poetry and various art forms as guided by the legacy of John Ashbery. He served formerly as Executive Director of Small Press Distribution and the Community of Literary Magazines and Presses, Development Director of the Creative Capital Foundation and Bette Midler's New York Restoration Project, and has been a fundraising and strategic planning consultant to numerous nonprofits. He holds a doctorate from Columbia University, where he also taught music history for a number of years, and has received numerous grants, awards and honors, including an individual artist grant from NYSCA. He recently edited Something Close to Music: Late Art Writing, Poems, and All Playlists by John Ashbery (Zwirner Books).

Veronica Santiago Liu is the founder and general coordinator of the collective that operates Word Up Community Bookshop/Librería Comunitaria, a 12-year-old bookshop and community arts space in Washington Heights, NYC. She also currently serves as editor at large at Seven Stories Press. Veronica was an inaugural member of the Committee on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion of the American Booksellers Association (ABA), served on the board of New Atlantic Independent Booksellers Association, and has been a Publishers Weekly Star Watch Honoree; an honorable mention for the ABA's Entrepreneurial Excellence Award; a judge for the Story Prize, Kirkus Prize for Fiction, and Firecracker Award for Fiction; and a literature division panelist for the New York State Council on the Arts.

Ricardo Alberto Maldonado was born and raised in Puerto Rico. He is the author of The Life Assignment (Four Way Books, 2020); the translator of Dinapiera Di Donato's Colaterales/Collateral (National Poetry Series / Akashic Books, 2013); and coeditor of Puerto Rico en mi corazón (Anomalous Press, 2019), a bilingual anthology that raised funds for grassroots recovery efforts in Puerto Rico after Hurricane Maria. Maldonado serves as President and Executive Director of the Academy of American Poets and is part of El proyecto de la literatura puertorriqueña / The Puerto Rican Literature Project, a forthcoming

online database collecting the creative output of Puerto Rican poets in the diaspora and archipelago.

Kim Marie McKeman, MBA, MS, is an international marketing leader, facilitator, and presenter. She left a career as a marketing executive to found her business, <u>Inspired Outcomes Now</u>, to help business owners bring their vision to life with a true brand that generates results. Over 130 organizations, from startups to 135-year-old nonprofits, have leveraged her A Nu WayTM Branding process to stand apart and build loyalty through authenticity. With an MBA from SUNY at Buffalo, an MS in Creative Problem Solving from the Center for Applied Imagination, and a facilitator certification in Appreciative Inquiry, Kim has both practical and academic credentials. Kim mentors literary organizations for the LitNYS Literary Advancement Program, conscious entrepreneurs at <u>Shift/Co</u>, and executives at <u>Collective Brains</u>. She meets you where you are and takes you where you want to go.

Alison Meyers is Executive Director of Writers & Books, a literary arts center in Rochester, NY. A veteran nonprofit leader, she previously led Cave Canem Foundation (Brooklyn, NY) as Executive Director, 2006-2016; served at Hill-Stead Museum (Farmington, CT) as Poetry Director and Director of Marketing & Communications, 2000-2006; and was General Manager of the Oberlin (OH) Consumers Co-op, a \$2.9 million bookstore serving Oberlin College & Conservatory and surrounding communities (1995-1999). For many years she owned and managed an independent bookstore in Connecticut. She consults, sits on panels, and presents widely; serves as a LitNYS mentor for New York State-based literary arts nonprofits; and is Treasurer of the Board of Kweli Journal. Alison is a Pushcart Prize-nominated poet, fiction writer, and essayist whose work may be found in journals and anthologies and at www.alisonmeyers.com.

Paul W. Morris is the Executive Director of House of SpeakEasy, a literary arts nonprofit based in New York City that connects writers with readers, students, educators, and booklovers. The former Director of Literary Programs at PEN America and Vice President of The Authors Guild, he has held editorial positions at Viking Penguin and Tricycle, as well as several publishers and magazines. From 2004 to 2011, he oversaw digital strategy, cultural partnerships, and marketing at BOMB Magazine, where he was General Manager. His writing has appeared in several anthologies, and his essay on Hermann Hesse was included as the introduction to a translation of Siddhartha. He sits on advisory committees for the National Book Foundation, the Brooklyn Book Festival, LitNet, and Lit Crawl NYC. He lives in New York City.

Bruce Morrow has 29 years of experience in fundraising and nonprofit leadership. He has worked with the Misty Copeland Foundation, The Trevor Project, GLAAD, Girl Scouts of the USA, Bank Street College of Education, and Teachers & Writers Collaborative. He is a former fiction editor at Callaloo and a co-editor of "Shade: An Anthology of Short Fiction by Gay Men of African Descent." His writing has been published in the New York Times, "Speak My Name: Black Men on Masculinity and the American Dream," and "Freedom in this Village: Twenty-Five Years of Black Gay Men's Writing." He holds a BS in Biology from RIT and an MFA in Creative

Writing from Columbia University, In 2023, his short film "In Dreams Begin..." won the Best LGBTQ Jury and Audience Awards at the Paris Short Film Festival.

Stephen Motika is the director and publisher of Nightboat Books. He previously held positions at Poets House, PEN America, The Graduate Center, CUNY, and Simon & Schuster. He is the author of the book of poems, Western Practice, and the chapbooks Arrival and at Mono, In the Madrones, and Private Archive. He is the editor of Tiresias: The Collected Poems of Leland Hickman and coeditor of Dear Kathleen: On the Occasion of Kathleen Fraser's 80th Birthday. His articles and poems have appeared in Another Chicago Magazine, At Length, BOMB, the Brooklyn Review, the Constant Critic, Eleven Eleven, Maggy, the Poetry Project Newsletter, Poets & Wrtiters, Poets.org and Vanitas, among other publications. He has held residencies at the Lannan Foundation, Marfa, TX; Lower Manhattan Cultural Council's Workspace; Millay Colony for the Arts; and ZK/U in Berlin, and taught at the Indiana University Writers Conference, Lehman College of the City University of New York, Naropa University, and the Stonecoast MFA Program at the University of Southern Maine.

Lee Norton is a member of the Editorial Collective at Ugly Duckling Presse, a nonprofit publisher for poetry, translation, experimental nonfiction, performance texts, and books by artists. From 2017-2022, he served as the Presse's Development Director, a role in which he helped design, fund, and launch the UDP Apprenticeship Program, now in its sixth year. He holds a PhD in English and Comparative Literature from UNC-Chapel Hill and teaches literature and writing at Queens College-CUNY. Since 2017, he has been the QC Writing Fellow to Townsend Harris High School's Bridge-Year program, where he mentors THHS seniors in writing and research and facilitates the annual THHS Humanities Symposium.

Debora Ott is a cultural/creative consultant whose abiding passion is to build community through a shared appreciation of the creative process. Her consulting practice focuses on capacity building, program development, succession, and strategic planning for nonprofit organizations. The founder of Just Buffalo Literary Center, Inc., where she served as Artistic/Executive Director for 23 years, she's the author of the monograph About Face – A Guide to Founder Transition, commissioned by the New York State Council on the Arts. In 1997, she accepted the New York State Governor's Arts Award at Lincoln Center. She served as Arts Education and Literature Program Manager at the Georgia Council for the Arts, and in 2001, founded LitNYS, formerly LitTAP, the Literary Technical Assistance Program, a coalition of New York State literary arts organizations. She's crafted LitNYS' capacity-building Advancement Regrant and Peer-Mentoring programs, over the last 20+ years, and curates Facing Pages, an annual, statewide, literary arts convening.

Chad W. Post is the director of Open Letter Books, a press at the University of Rochester dedicated to publishing contemporary literature from around the world. In addition, he is the managing editor of Three Percent, a blog and review site that promotes literature in translation and is home to the Translation Database, the Best Translated Book Awards, and the Three Percent and Two Month Review podcasts. He is also the author of The Three Percent Problem: Rants and Responses on Publishing, Translation, and the Future of Reading. His articles and

book reviews have appeared in a range of publications including The Believer, Publishing Perspectives, the Wall Street Journal culture blog, Bookforum, Rolling Stone, and Quarterly Conversation, among others.

Martha Rhodes is the author of five poetry collections, most recently The Thin Wall (University of Pittsburgh Press's Pitt Poetry Series, 2017). She is a member of the faculty of the MFA Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College, teaches at conferences around the country, and meets with writing students and adult writers around the country, including the Bread Loaf Writers Conference, the Colrain Manuscript Conference, the Michener Center, Syracuse MFA, Cave Canem, etc. She was the director of the Frost Place Conference on Poetry from 2008-2018. Rhodes is a founder of Four Way Books which is celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2023. She serves as the publisher and executive editor. Her authors include Tommye Blount, John Murillo, Gregory Pardlo, Allison Benis White, and Andrea Cohen, among many others. Rhodes lives and works in NYC.

Ira Silverberg is a consultant to writers, artists, and arts organizations. He's been Editor-in Chief of Grove Press; Publisher and co-editorial director of High Risk Books/Serpent's Tail; and a senior editor at Simon & Schuster. He's also worked on the nonprofit side of the literary arts as Literature Director at the National Endowment for the Arts; as a senior consultant for Bloomberg Philanthropies Arts Innovation Management program; and an advisor and mentor for LitNYS. He has advised dozens of arts organizations in capacity development; board building and management; staffing; mission building; strategic planning; sales, marketing, and distribution; publicity; annual campaigns; and grant writing.
